We appreciate their willingness to serve and further the mission of the ABFFD.

Since May of 2020, the ABFFD has sponsored a monthly <u>Round Table Discussion</u> to discuss topics relevant to the board certification process. These meetings are open to applicants for BCS-F, individuals who are considering applying for BCS-F, current or potential mentors, board members, and people with fluency disorders from the community with an interest in the process. These meetings have been well-attended and feedback has been very positive. A wide variety of topics have been presented and discussed.

The format of the Round Table Discussions has evolved over the past year. Currently, the first 45 minutes is spent on a pre-selected topic of interest. The topic could be addressed through a presentation followed by a discussion, a panel, or a discussion facilitated by a board member. The last 15 to 30 minutes is spent answering questions participants may have regarding the process of becoming a BCS-F or mentoring a candidate.

The Thursday, January 21, 2021 Round Table Discussion was facilitated by Carl Herder, CE Coordinator and included a focused discussion about <u>Community Resources for Children and Adults who Stutter</u>. Representatives of 4 different service organizations designed to help people who stutter were invited guests and each spoke briefly about their organization's purpose and activities. Following questions from participants about the organizations, the remainder of the meeting was spent addressing questions regarding the process of becoming a BCS-F.

A Round Table Discussion on Sunday, February 21, 2021 addressed <u>Practical Help Using Zoom and Other Platforms</u>. Glenn Weybright, CE Coordinator, facilitated a lively discussion where participants shared a plethora of creative teletherapy ideas. It appeared the discussion could have continued but time was reserved at the end to address questions regarding the board certification process.

On Thursday, March 25, 2021, the Round Table Discussion topic was <u>Client-Driven Therapy</u> and the meeting was facilitated by Rita Thurman, Chair of the ABFFD. This topic was selected because an area of weakness noted in some applications for BCS-F is when therapy does not appear to be client driven or individualized to reflect the particular needs and desires of that specific client. Again, round table participants contributed fabulous ideas about how to make

therapy more client-driven to meet each client's needs. The last few minutes of the meeting were devoted to taking questions from applicants or prospective applicants for board certification.

Saturday, April 24, 2021, the Round Table Discussion topic was **The Therapeutic Dance** and it was facilitated by Glenn Weybright, CE Coordinator. Glenn created a very thorough and well-thought-out presentation on this topic, exploring the "art" of doing therapy which includes all the things we were NOT taught in graduate school but which many good clinicians do intuitively or learn to do with experience. A fascinating discussion took place with a wonderful exchange of ideas.

The next Round Table will be Sunday, May 23 at 5:00 p.m. Eastern time and the topic will be: "Putting Our Heads Together" a clinical review of targeted case studies. Members could bring a challenging therapy situation for everyone to discuss. These discussions will be facilitated by Rita Thurman.

If you have been unable to attend a Round Table discussion live, a recording of each of these sessions is available on the ABFFD website. Feedback suggests the Board is in fact making the board certification process more transparent and accessible. We want everyone to know this resource is available, even if someone can't join the discussion "live".

# **BOARD MEMBERS IN THE NEWS**

Rita Thurman, Chair, attended the Oxford Dysfluency Conference in January and attended the SFA webinar "An Acceptance and Commitment Therapy Taster" in February; the FRIENDS Community Speaker Series "Stuttering Around the World" which was an international panel of teens and young adults who stutter in March; and the NSA's "PWS Panel for SLP's" and the Spring 2 Day Conference. Rita also ran monthly workshops for an adult support group, a teen support group, and a children's support group.

Elyse Lambeth, Vice Chair, attended the Oxford Dysfluency Conference in January.

Glenn Weybright, CE Co-Coordinator, facilitated the ABFFD Round Table meeting on Teletherapy on February 21, 2021. Glenn also virtually accompanied one of his former clients, now a high school junior and a person who stutters, as he spoke to Dr. Megann McGill's Stuttering Lab students at Portland State University. He also helped interview prospective graduate students in the Communication Sciences and Disorders Program at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon in February 2021. Glenn will deliver a one hour talk on writing holistic goals for students who stutter to speech-language pathologists from the Salem-Keizer school district in Salem, Oregon in April 2021. Glenn continues to mentor a graduate student in speech-language pathology, who is a person who stutters, as she navigates her clinical externship and faces obstacles like families requesting a different SLP or a client's family member laughing when she introduced herself because of her stuttering.

Nola Radford, Community Outreach, is new to the Board and is working to "flesh out" specific initiatives relative to community outreach while encouraging students to consider pursuing

specialty certification in stuttering. Nola also published a case study: "Positive Messages and Traditional Therapy for Three Children Who Stutter" https://doi.org/10.1080/1034912X.2021.1885630

Carl Herder, CE Co-Coordinator, facilitated the ABFFD Round Table Discussion on January 21, 2021 concerning community resources for individuals who stutter.

Brooke Leiman Edwards, Certification Co-Coordinator, attended the Oxford Dysfluency Conference online in January 2021.

Reuben Schuff, Consumer Representative, discussed his stuttering journey on Stutter Block Party - Stamily Stories in January 2021. Reuben also will be an advisor for the Stuttering Scholarship Alliance.

Risa Battino, Social Media Director, attended the Oxford Dysfluency Conference in January 2021 and plans to attend the NSA Spring2Day Conference in April 2021.

Laura Johnson, Treasurer, is new to the Board and has been instrumental in researching options for a new ABFFD website. Laura also created case studies with the professor of the graduate class at U. of Wisconsin Whitewater and then participated in a client simulation, playing the roles of individuals of all ages who stutter. Laura, has participated in a number of SFA webinars and Montreal Fluency Center's Guest Speaker series.

Tricia Krauss-Lehrman, Public Relations and Marketing chair, interviewed graduate students from UTD for the Dallas TWST internship position and helped plan and run the monthly Dallas TWST meetings. Tricia also facilitated a support group for parents of preschool children showing signs of stuttering in January of 2021. Tricia attended the SFA webinar "An Acceptance and Commitment Therapy Taster" in February; the FRIENDS Community Speaker Series "Stuttering Around the World" which was an international panel of teens and young adults who stutter in March; and the NSA's "PWS Panel for SLP's" and the Spring2Day Conference in April 2021.

# **ABFFD MANUAL CHANGES**

The ABFFD voted to approve the following updates to the manual:

New Applicants for BCS-F	
	Requirement
How long after obtaining CCC can an applicant apply?	3 years or full time equivalent
How many CEUs?	Within the last 3 years, an applicant must have obtained 6 CEUs of intermediate to advanced training in fluency disorders with at least 4.8 CEUs being "live hours"
How many clinical hours?	Within the last 5 years, an applicant must have obtained 450 clinical hours with at least

	25 hours in each of the age ranges (preschool, school age, adolescent/adult)
How many of an applicant's hours can be supervision?	Up to 135 of the 450 direct contact hours may be supervision of student clinicians or certified clinicians who are working under the applicant's guidance
How many of an applicant's hours can be indirect hours (e.g., program development, presentations, teaching)?	None

In addition to the changes above, the letters of recommendation submitted by applicants no longer need to include one from a BCS-F.

# ABOUT THE AMERICAN BOARD OF FLUENCY AND FLUENCY DISORDERS

The American Board of Fluency and Fluency Disorders was the first clinical specialty program approved by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association in 1998. The idea of a specialty program was driven by the need to give consumers access to professionals with advanced knowledge and skills, and to educate and recognize expert clinicians. The specialty program, initially known as the Specialty Board on Fluency Disorders, came into being through the efforts of both professionals and consumers. It was championed by ASHA's Special Interest Division 4, Fluency and Fluency Disorders, with support from the National Stuttering Association and the Stuttering Foundation of America.
